Doing lots of practice questions will help with becoming familiar with question types but what else can you do to improve in this area?

- Any 'spatial' question type will help to train your brain and become accustomed to these types of question.
- Try question types such as: shaded nets, fold and punch and different views of 3D shapes for more options of spatial questions.
- Physical items such as building blocks, lego or mathlink cubes are great aids for spatial reasoning questions.
